II. Catalog Description: ENGL 101B/102B. FRESHMAN COMPOSITION (Credit, 3 hours each). Emphasis on writing as a learning, thinking process. Discussion of and practice in strategies used in prewriting, writing, and revising expressive, informative, analytical and argumentative essays. Special sections designated for honors students.

Instructor's Emphasis: ENGL 102B is a freshman-level course designed to guide students to proficiency in writing the five-paragraph essay using standard English and to do research, effectively integrating and acknowledging reliable source material in their writing. The instructor will continue to encourage the use of the writing process, as in ENGL 101B, while assigning essays with designated methods of development and emphasizing practice in revising and editing.

<u>New Program Emphasis</u>: Students in Freshman Composition 2 will demonstrate proficiency in standard English grammar, punctuation, and mechanics by editing their essays. Several new English program composition policies will make grammar instruction and self-editing much more effective:

➤ Because most college-level essays are written from an observer's stance in third person, third person will be considered the default point of view for writing. (An example of writing in third person is stating: "Many SU students use multiple forms of social media, such as Facebook, Instagram and Pinterest.") In other words, unless otherwise stated, students will be expected to write in the third person **present** tense. The results will be students more quickly becoming aware of, and learning to correct, their noun/verb and pronoun agreement issues, rather than avoiding them by using first person and/or past tense or shifts in point of view and tense

- > Students will be asked to spell out all contractions, because most contractions are not standard, and even standard contractions help disguise noun/verb disagreement.
- ➤ Grammar review will include definition of present-tense verbs (including present-tense helping verbs) and exercises identifying them in multiple writing examples and in students' own work. Similarly, students will be taught and asked to identify all pronouns and all subject nouns, in the process of determining noun/verb agreement.
- Instructors will integrate instruction in grammar, mechanics and proofreading throughout the semester.

- E. Demonstrate the ability to use computer technology by obtaining assignments, participating in course activities, editing essays, managing course information, submitting word-processed final drafts, and using tutor-assisted software.
