II. Course Goals, Objectives, and Content

A. Course Goals:

- (1)To make the students aware of the importance of ethical conduct.
- (2)To teach the students to deal with professional and ethical issues they may face throughout their careers in rehabilitation counseling and related helping professions.

B. Course Objectives:

- (1) To provide students with an understanding of five (5) ethical principles (autonomy, beneficence, nonmaleficence, fidelity, and justice) and their influence on both the process of rehabilitation individuals with disabilities and the public policy on disability.
- (2) To provide students with an increased understanding of the Code of Professional Ethics for Rehabilitation Counselors.
- (3) To introduce the students to the ethical standards of various helping professions.
- (4) To provide students with the opportunity to practice identifying, analyzing, and resolving ethical dilemmas encountered in the case management process.

C. Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to

- distinguish among the five ethical principles guiding rehabilitation practice.
- distinguish between principle ethics and virtue ethics.
- explain the uses and limitations of professional codes of ethics.
- resolve ethical dilemmas encountered in the rehabilitation counseling field.
- demonstrate an ethical decision-making model for effectively resolving ethical dilemmas.
- differentiate between ethics and laws
- describe how their culture, life experiences, attitudes, values and biases might influence their view of rehabilitation counseling practice.
- discuss the 4 conditions (duty, breach of duty, injury, causation) that must be present in malpractice litigation.
- debate whether and why dual and multiple relationships pose an ethical challenge to counselors
- explain HIPAA and how it pertains to protection of confidentiality.
- describe, from a *legal* perspective, the elements of adequate informed consent.
- substantiate, from an ethical perspective, the paramount importance of informed consent.
- interact effectively, sensitively, and ethically with people from diverse backgrounds and demonstrate understanding of the sociocultural contexts that influence individual differences.
